# Navigating the Depths: Problems, Progress, and Prospects in Asian Underwater Archaeology

By telling tales through time, the session will highlight the progress made through recent and re-examined archaeological discoveries, technological advances, new theoretical perspectives and collaborative initiatives that enhance our understanding of Asia's unique underwater cultural heritage.

The session will further address prospects for the future of underwater archaeological research in the region, including the potential for greater regional cooperation, new funding mechanisms, and the integration of underwater heritage into broader cultural and environmental conservation strategies.

A platform for interdisciplinary dialogue and knowledge exchange, the inclusive, genderbalanced session seeks to showcase diverse perspectives and dissenting voices. We strongly encourage and value contributions from minoritised and underrepresented communities and those employing transformative and participatory approaches that enrich our collective understanding of underwater cultural heritage in the Asian region.
